

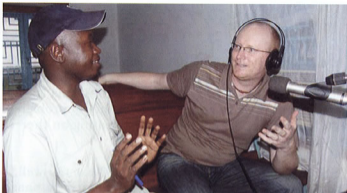
## Peace Radio Interview

When John Paul Kiffasi interviewed recent visitor from Czech Republic, Daniel Skokan (FEED THE HUNGRY), listeners were blessed and encouraged. Their life may be hard in Africa, but they are free to enjoy God, which is sometimes constrained in Europe.

Daniel explained, "When God converted me, I was 17 years old. I put down my cigarette and said 'God, if you are there, show me.' His presence was so real, I wept. My family warned me **'If you have to keep a bible, hide it in your room. It's a ticket to jail. You will never get into Uni. And we will lose our jobs.'**

I was constantly threatened 'Stop talking about God. You are a danger to us.' Even now 99% of Czech Republic is atheist. They say 'How can you believe in a God? You must be primitive. Or sick in your mind.' Communism has fallen so it has changed now, but not completely."

John Paul reminded our listeners "It's good for us in Africa to understand the privilege of being able to love God openly. Yet we should be the ones angry with God, saying 'Why are we stinking poor?'"



Despite sickness and war and camp life, our love for God increases every day. Some admire the European way of life. Many want a visa, yet they are rushing to live in a society with no moral absolutes."

Daniel commented, "You have a good society here in Uganda. No euthanasia. No homosexual marriages. No abortions. No public nakedness."

Childcare is setting good morals for living. At CKS centre, love and peace are overwhelming. You can see God everywhere. The joy expressed by the children speaks for itself. This is paradise in the midst of darkness."

Daniel returned to his office in Czech Republic and boosted FEED THE HUNGRY's monthly contribution to buy food for our orphans, and for mechanical repairs to our overworked trucks.
